Sir Ross Cranston QC is professor of law at the LSE, where he was previously Cassel Professor of Commercial Law and then a Centennial Professor. He was a judge of the High Court, Queen's Bench Division for just over nine years and the judge in charge of the Administrative Court from January 2016. He was MP for Dudley North 1997-2005 and Solicitor General for England and Wales 1998-2001. He was educated at the University of Queensland, Harvard Law School and the University of Oxford.
