
# Publication of the proceedings of the joint event with the AIJA and the ALJ: Enduring Courts in Changing Times

### Publication of selected papers of the Hon James Allsop AC SC

The AAL has again joined with **The Federation Press**, this time to publish a selection of the papers of **the Hon James Allsop AC SC**, the former Chief Justice of the Federal Court of Australia and who was such a strong supporter of the AAL during his term of office.

**Dr Ruth Higgins SC** and **Kevin Connor SC** are the editors of the volume. They have written the introduction. The manuscript has been delivered to the Federation Press.

I am pleased to report that **Chief Justice Stephen Gageler AC** has contributed the Foreword. I thank him.

We are aiming to publish the volume in the first half of 2024.



Desmond Browne is well known to many Fellows as he has strong Australian connections and is a frequent visitor here. He is a former Chairman of the Bar, former Treasurer of Gray's Inn and former Joint Head of Chambers at 5RB for 19 years (with Justin Rushbrooke KC). In the Queens' Birthday Honours List 2020, he was appointed Commander of the Order of the British Empire (CBE) for services to the Inns of Court and diversity at the Bar. His practice centred on media law, particularly defamation and privacy.

The conversation at this very enjoyable event ranged from defamation, privacy, and diversity in the profession and on the courts. I thank **Desmond Browne** for his participation.

### ACT event 23 April 2024 5:00 PM, AEST Michael Coper Roundtable

At the High Court of Australia, Parkes, Canberra In Person Event Canberra - Fellows Only

Presentation on Genocide and the International Court of Justice by Professor Donald Rothwell.

Professor Rothwell discussed three cases presently running in the International Court of Justice (ICJ):

- 1. *Ukraine v. Russian Federation*, dealing with Russia's allegation that genocide was taking place in Ukraine; and Ukraine's proceedings brought to counter that claim;
- 2. South Africa v. Israel, alleging that Israel is committing acts of genocide against Palestinian peoples in Gaza; and
- 3. *Nicaragua v. Germany*, alleging that Germany is supporting acts of genocide by supplying Israel with military assistance and suspending aid.

The event was chaired by **Emeritus Professor Stephen Bottomley**.

17 Fellows heard **Professor Rothwell** explain these cases, brought under the 1948 Convention on the

Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide. He made the point that it is unprecedented for the ICJ to be involved in these high profile genocide cases. He also discussed the 32 interventions, including Australia's, in the Ukraine case and the issue of Provisional Measures.

The first two cases will now proceed to the merits phase.

The lively questions and comments, particularly by the international lawyers in the group, and the size of the group, made this a most rewarding seminar.



I gave a short introduction bringing Fellows up to date with the very recent activities of the Academy and the events planned over the next 6 months.

I thank Professor Rothwell and the members of the ACT Organising Committee, Professor Stephen Bottomley, the Hon Mary Finn, Mr Ian Govey AM and Mr Russell Miller AM.
